Stop the Flu Before It Starts By Janet Collins, MD, MPH

It's that time of year again. The leaves are starting to turn, the evenings are getting cool, and we have to start thinking about the coming winter. One of the things to think about as winter approaches is preventing the seasonal flu. There has been much talk lately about the avian "bird" flu, which, fortunately has not made its way across the Atlantic to the U.S. at this time. Seasonal flu however, comes predictably every fall and stays for a good portion of the winter.

The seasonal flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. The virus is spread mainly from person to person through coughing or sneezing, although it can be picked up via contact with contaminated surfaces. These viruses can cause mild to severe illness, and in some cases can be fatal. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), between 5% and 20% of people in the U.S. get the seasonal flu each year, more than 200,000 are hospitalized with flu complications, and 36,000 die from the seasonal

Flu symptoms may be mild or severe. They can include headache, runny nose, cough, sore throat, and generalized aches and pains. Some people, especially kids, may experience nausea, vomiting and diarrhea upset as well. In some cases, complications can develop and may include bacterial pneu-



monia, ear infections, sinus infections, dehydration, and worsening of chronic medical conditions, such as congestive heart failure, asthma, or diabetes.

There are ways to minimize risk of developing seasonal flu. Keeping yourself in good health is an important means to decrease risk of severe flu symptoms. The most significant action you can take is to get a yearly flu shot. The flu shot is an inactivated vaccine (containing killed virus) that is given with a needle, usually in the arm. The flu shot is approved for use in people older than 6 months, including healthy people, and people with chronic medical conditions. The CDC recommends flu shots for people at higher risk of developing serious complications including persons with chronic diseases like diabetes or lung disorders, pregnant women, individuals over the age of 50, and anyone else who wishes to reduce their chances of getting the flu. People who have a severe allergy to chicken eggs or those who have had a bad reaction to a flu shot in the past should not get the vaccine. People

who have a moderate or severe illness with a fever should wait to get vaccinated until their symptoms lessen. You should get the flu shot in October or November to assure optimum timing. Flu season can begin as early as October and can last as late as May. Since the strains of flu can vary from year to year, the vaccine is updated yearly too. This means that the flu shot you got last year will not protect you from the strains circulating this year. This year's exotic sounding strains are: A/Solomon Islands/3/2006, A/Wisconsin/67/2005, and

A/Wisconsin/67/2005, and B/Malaysia/2506/2004.
Some people experience discomfort or redness at the vaccine injection site. Others have

reported low-grade fevers or aches after getting the flu shot. These effects are usually mild. You cannot get the flu from the flu shot, as the vaccine is prepared from killed virus.

People can actually spread the flu to others even before they themselves have developed any symptoms.

This year there is plenty of vaccine to go around. That means that anyone who wants to get vaccinated should be able to do so without difficulty.

In summary, getting the flu shot on a yearly basis is a safe way to decrease your risk of getting the seasonal flu and its complications.

The Munis implementation continues to march on. Since our last communication, the various teams have been working on all aspects of the next systems to go live. Next up to go live is business licenses.




ture is a work in progress, but our intent is to be as transparent as possible with the Munis implementation.

The Police Department is seeking new members for their Explorer Program!

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Explorer Program is offered by the Schaumburg Police Department to mentor young men and women, ages 14 to 21, who have an expressed interest in pursuing a future career in the field of law enforcement.

APPLICANT REQUIREMENTS

Participants younger than 18 years of age must have the approval of parents or guardians.

- An Explorer applicant must be between the ages of 14 and 21 and/or have graduated the eighth grade.
- Applicants must be residents of the Village of Schaumburg or attend a Schaumburg school.
- Applicants must submit a Schaumburg Police
 Department Law
 Enforcement Explorer Post
 #31 Membership Package
 and agree to a thorough
 background check.
- Applicants must agree to pay an annual fee of \$7 to Learning for Life at the time their application is submitted.
- Applicants must assume responsibility for purchasing a portion of their own uniform, to include one pair of black trousers, a black belt, and black shoes.



 The applicant and a parent or guardian must sign a Liability Release Waiver

These areas are based and conducted in a public safety environment. SPD Explorer Post #31 provides an opportunity for young men and women to receive and participate in hands-on instruction regarding the duties of a police officer and the role of law enforcement in the community.
