Because mulch is an increasingly hard to find resource, their new challenge is to find other reserves. The team and DPW management are in the process of exploring various avenues to ensure that an adequate supply of raw materials will be available for future production.

At the Public Works facility on Naper/Plainfield Road and 104th Street, the interface between DPW operators and customers is paramount to the success of the mulch program. The team has mastered the entire process, and orders of all sizes from wholesale landscapers are handled efficiently.

This is the DPW Gainsharing Team's fourth project. The team continues to research innovative revenue saving projects - watch for them in the upcoming year.

Fuel Conservation Tips

ith crude oil and fuel prices at such high levels, it is imperative that all \mathbf{T} city employees strive to eliminate FUEL unnecessary fuel usage. The goal of the citywide Fuel Conservation Program is to improve fuel economy by 10 percent. Use of the driving practices described below will help to decrease fuel usage:

Engine Start Up Technique: When starting either a gas or diesel engine, do not press on the accelerator; it is unnecessary and wastes fuel.

Engine Warm Up Practices: The most fuel efficient way to warm up a gasoline engine and heat the interior of the car is to drive it. If the temperature is above 32 degrees, 30 seconds is an adequate warm up time. If the temperature is below 32 degrees, idle for two minutes or until the frost is removed from the windows.

Diesel engines: When the temperature is at least 32 degrees, warm up the engine until all pressure readings are acceptable, all "wait" lights are off and at least two minutes have passed. If the vehicle is parked inside, follow the same directions. If the vehicle is parked outside and the temperature is below 32 degrees, follow the directions listed above, but let the vehicle idle for at least five minutes instead of two.
