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ABOUT STUDENT CHAPTERS

Beginning and maintaining an ICMA Student Chapter at your college or University not only benefits you the student, but it also benefits you the next generation local government administrator. The purpose of the ICMA Student chapter program, started in 2010, is to introduce and integrate students of all ages to the local government management profession.

As a part of ICMA's Next Generation Initiatives, chapters exist to establish connections between ICMA, schools, students, state associations, and managers. Content and program activities are a partnership between ICMA and the colleges/universities. ICMA strives to create program content that engages and excites current MPA/MPP students about the profession of city/county management. Through our student chapters, we also hope to attract undergraduate students who are interested in public service, but may not be aware of career possibilities in local government.













3 KEY PHASES OF A STUDENT CHAPTER

PHASE 1: ESTABLISH

Each chapter develops their own charter, by laws, strategic plan, and establishes a student chapter board with a designated President.

Each chapter must have a Student Chapter Advisor and ICMA Chapter Mentor. It is the responsibility of the chapter to create relationship with mentor in the community.

PHASE 2: RECRUIT

Chapters are responsible for recruiting members and having them sign up for ICMA membership. Each chapter is different and some require chapter dues for meetings and and events.

Each chapter has unlimited memberships. Students receive a 2-year membership and free registration to ICMA conferences.

PHASE 3: MAINTENANCE

Chapters hold meetings, engage guest presenters, and engage with other chapters. Engage with student chapter alumni, ICMA members in the region, and state/regional associations. Chapters can submit their best event held throughout the year for the Best Chapter Event Contest to receive funds for the annual conference.

Chapters submit an annual report that discusses what the chapter accomplished throughout the year.



PHASE 1: ESTABLISH

Starting a student chapter is easy. There is no chapter-establishment fee. Once established, all chapter members will be eligible for free student memberships.



Secure Student Chapter Leadership

Each student chapter needs a president, faculty advisor, and chapter mentor. The leadership of the student chapter is vital to the success and sustainability of the student chapter.

Student Chapter President- an active student member that takes the lead on student chapter communications, recruitments, and events. Serves as a liaison for the chapter and ICMA.

Student Chapter Faculty Advisor- an MPA professor or program director to act as the chapter's faculty advisor. Serve as a liaison for the chapter and ICMA. Responsible for ensuring the chapter is active and receives ICMA communications. The university is entitled to one complimentary academic membership, which is reserved for the chapter advisor.

Student Chapter Mentor- a local government professional in your area (ideally an ICMA member interested in shared responsibility for the success of the chapter) to act as the chapter members. The Chapter's Mentor is primarily a resource in the profession whom the chapter members can go to for guidance or connections in the field, use as a guest speaker, use to get access to other guest speakers or as a judge for chapter events, and so on. The second role of the Management Mentor is as a stabilizing force should the faculty advisor leave the school. With both a Faculty Advisor and a Management Mentor, we reduce the chance of a chapter dissolving should one of them depart.

If your search for a mentor in your area is unsuccessful, contact ICMA for assistance. Student chapter mentors do not receive free membership to ICMA for their service, although we highly recommend they consider joining.

Complete the Student Chapter Agreement

Once you have determined the leaders of your student chapter, you will complete the student chapter agreement here. Each chapter is encouraged to create a student chapter-specific email to ensure communications continue when the president graduates or the faculty advisor leaves the university. Complete the <u>Student Chapter Agreement</u>.

Create your Charter and Develop a Strategic Plan

Each student chapter should create a charter that defines and establishes the purpose of the organization. This will help guide future student chapter. You can find a template and examples in the back of this packet.

Consider developing a strategic plan for the chapter. Some of the most successful chapters attribute that success to a commitment to a strategic plan. It may be a tedious process, but it will come in handy, especially during leadership transitions. Be sure the plan will get the chapter through at least one leadership transition. It will help guide the next board and will give them time to get in the swing of things before they must develop a plan of their own.



PHASE 1: ESTABLISH



WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO BE A STUDENT CHAPTER MEMBER?

Any full or part-time undergraduate or graduate student who is currently not an ICMA member or in a local government position of department head or higher.

Student Chapter Agreement

Our university/college/school/program, acknowledges launching or continuing an ICMA Student Chapter at our school. In doing so, we agree to:

- Ensure our chapter members successfully join ICMA.
- Develop a charter for our chapter and submit to ICMA within a reasonable amount of time after initial assembly.
- Appoint an official chapter faculty advisor (an administrator or lecturer/professor from the school or delegated partner).
- Appoint an official chapter practitioner advisor/mentor in the profession (a manager or deputy/assistant from a nearby or US local government).
- Form a core of leadership for our chapter from among the student body and designate an officer (usually the Chapter President) to be the lead point of contact with ICMA.
- Acknowledge that our chapter includes one complimentary academic membership for an academic at our school.
- Communicate any issues to ICMA in a timely manner, if assistance is needed.
- Forward or otherwise distribute communications from ICMA to our student membership.

- Create and maintain an email address for chapter use (e.g. ICMAStudentsBGU@gmail.com)
- Submit an annual summary (1-2 pages) detailing our activities and accomplishments for posting on the ICMA website at the end of our academic year.
- Ensure chapter members abide by the ICMA Code of Ethics* while they are affiliated as a member through this Student Chapter. As a member, your actions reflect upon the other members of the association.
- Acknowledge that we may be an official ICMA Student Chapter as long as we remain active and that ICMA encourages our school to recruit an unlimited number of student members (including graduate and undergraduate students).



Upon establishment, chapters will receive a special join code for student members. Those who use the code to join will receive all member benefits for two years. One of the goals of the ICMA Student Chapter Program is to attract students to the local government profession. Although student chapters primarily attract students in MPA programs, any student can be a member. We recommend using the following tools and events to educate others about local government and/or your student chapter:

The key to successful student chapter event planning is delegation. After deciding on a specific event and/or guest speaker, be sure to divvy up the responsibilities equally among board members. Most events will require everyone's help. List out each required task and assign responsibility for each to an individual. Secure a speaker. Collaborate with like organizations. Reserve a space. Develop a social media and marketing plan. Designate a set-up/cleanup crew.

Don't be afraid to start small with events (ex: one speaker instead of a full panel) and to spend time planning a small number of well-executed events per semester instead of a large number of forgettable ones. Quantity does not outweigh quality in this case. It's all about what your chapter's board can handle and the sooner you all figure that out, the better. Below are some example events:

BEST CHAPTER EVENT CONTEST

At the school year's end, ICMA calls out to student chapters to submit their best student chapter event. This is an opportunity for student chapters to win funds to attend the annual conference or put toward student chapter activities throughout the year. Each year three winners are chosen, and the ICMA Executive Board judges submissions. Submissions are judged on the topic of the event, the involvement, and the impact of the event.

Keep an eye out for communications in the Spring, and submit your event!



Example Events & Initiatives

Discussion Panel	Assemble a group of professionals to discuss a pressing issue in the field or in your community.	
Social/Mixer	Invite chapter members, MPA students, undergraduates, professors, etc. to socialize. Use this opportunity to do some light recruiting.	
City Manager Shadowing	Recruit city administrators in your area who are willing to allow one or more students to accompany him/her as he/she performs the duties of his/her position.	
Guest Speaker "TED Talk"	Invite academics, authors, and practitioners to give a lecture or talk on a subject in their field of expertise.	
Networking Events	Organize opportunities for chapter members to expand their networks. Invite public service workers in your area, alumni, faculty, and even chapter members from other universities. Chapters could also opt to attend networking events that have been organized by other organizations.	
Speed-Mentoring/Speed Coaching	Organize an event like speed-dating for mentees (students) and mentors (professors and practitioners) to facilitate quick meetings for career development tips.	
Career Skills Workshop/Seminar	Collaborate with your school's career services department to organize workshops or seminars geared toward skills like resume writing and interviewing.	
Case Challenge	Recruit local governments to submit challenges facing their institutions that might represent an educational opportunity for students. After selecting a case/organization, allow interested students to sign up and form teams to participate. On the day of the event, reveal the case and give the teams a pre-designated amount of time to come up with a solution. Invite local administrators to choose the winner.	
Field Trips	Plan a student chapter event to your community's water treatment plant, city hall, or library. This is a great opportunity to talk with staff who work within the department or organization as a whole about the work they do for your community.	



ICMA Student Chapters are living, breathing organizations. They need nurturing and maintenance. Use the following tips to make sure your chapter remains sustainable.

Build Chapter Sustainability

Establish an ICMA Student Chapter board. Each seat in the board should be important and duties should be established upfront. This creates buy-in among everyone on the board. Collaborative leadership will be key.

Draft a strategic plan. Some of the most successful chapters attribute that success to a commitment to a strategic plan. It may be a tedious process, but it will come in handy, especially during leadership ransitions.

- Be sure the plan will get the chapter through at least one leadership transition. It
 will help guide the next board and will give them time to get in the swing of
 things before they must develop a plan of their own.
- It's okay to be ambitious in your plan, but it's important to be realistic too. Set goals that will push your chapter, but won't knock it down if they aren't achieved.

Build your chapter's relationship with its mentor. Oftentimes individuals that have agreed to mentor are active members of ICMA. Get that relationship going. You will need their advice, their connections and their influence.

Leadership Transition is key to ensuring a smooth transition each and every year. Make sure you have a plan in place to pass the torch to the next president of your student chapter.



Build Your Chapter's Network

- **Reach out to program and chapter alumni.** Let them know you welcome any help they are willing to offer. Note: Using alumni as speakers at events is a good way to engage them and mitigate costs for the chapter. Chapters have opted to create alumni boards that advise them. These boards can be involved in the selection of board members as well.
- **Reach out to your state association.** These organizations are great resources for funding, partnerships, scholarships, ideas, etc.
- Try to organize networking/coaching sessions with association members, chapter members, and other students in your program.
- **Partner with chapters at other schools.** Joint initiatives and events are among some of the most successful chapter events. If you aren't located near another university with a chapter, you can always reach out for ideas and advice.







Build Your Chapter's Brand

- Focus on the general public too. Your student body is important, but events do
 not always have to be student-only and efforts do not always have to be
 student-focused.
- Tap into any funds that are available to student organizations from your school. It's free money! You can also work with your university to find out if there are any other ways to access funding for student organizations.
- Never underestimate the power of word of mouth. It's free. And it works. Most of your future members don't even know your chapter exists yet.
- Find ICMA student members on campus. Do your best to get them involved with the student chapter. Don't be afraid to use the free membership as one of your selling points.
- Is local government management an afterthought in your program? This is quite common. In the past, chapters have worked with the deans of their colleges to use chapter activities to fill the local government gaps in the curriculum.
- Use topics and issues discussed in your classes as themes for panels and other events. This is a foolproof way to get support from students in your program who are not members of the student chapter.



Strong Regional Roots

ICMA works with a number of state-based associations for local government professionals to promote the highest ethical standards of professional behavior, provide professional development opportunities, and gather and share information to city and county leaders. Contact your state's association for partnership and scholarship opportunities, information on state events, and access to some of the state's leading public administrators. If possible, try to attend state meetings and conferences. They are invaluable opportunities to network with public service professionals in your state and helps demonstrate the need for state associations to develop programming that engages upcoming professionals.
