

# 2025 EMO Peer Learning Cohort & Mini Grant Program REQUEST FOR APPLICATIONS

ICMA's Economic Mobility and Opportunity (EMO) Peer Learning Cohort and Mini Grant Program is a unique and rare opportunity for ICMA members to receive professional development and funding to inform policies and effect conditions that promote overall well-being and increased opportunities for their residents. This program from ICMA is made possible with support from the Gates Foundation.

The goals of this opportunity are to 1) increase local decision-makers' understanding of drivers of and barriers to economic mobility and opportunity and 2) support local leaders in identifying and implementing actions to advance upward economic mobility and opportunity for residents of their communities.

ICMA plans to select teams from up to 15 local governments to make up the 2025 EMO Cohort. The selected local governments will each receive a grant of \$20,000 plus travel funds for the implementation of an economic mobility and opportunity assessment, planning or engagement process, or other local activity as part of their participation in the cohort. To support these activities, between May 2025 and December 2025, teams will participate in regular virtual and in-person learning opportunities and access guidance from ICMA staff and subject matter experts about practical tools and resources to apply within their community.

# ELIGIBILITY

- Applications must be submitted by U.S. local government entities and identify a team of two participating representatives.
- One of the team members must be the local government's chief administrative officer (CAO) or assistant chief administrative officer (ACAO). The second project team member may include additional staff, elected official, chamber member, representative of other community partners, etc.
- Teams must include at least one ICMA member.

# **IDEAL TEAM MEMBERS**

- Local decision-makers who are committed to improving economic outcomes for residents.
- Interested in exploring a wide range of themes related to economic mobility and opportunity such as addressing intergenerational poverty, post-secondary education/workforce development, housing, etc.
- Willing and enthusiastic participants in discussion and learning opportunities.

# PARTICIPATION EXPECTATIONS

- Attendance is expected of both participants at two in-person events, with travel costs for two participants per local government covered by ICMA.
  - The first event is scheduled for May 21-23 at the <u>Economic Mobility and Opportunity</u> <u>Conference</u> in Baltimore, MD.
  - The second event is tentatively scheduled for December 10-12, location TBD.
- Team participation in monthly virtual cohort calls of up to 90 minutes each.
- Submission of a Work Plan and Project Budget for use of grant funds after selection, with funding awarded following an executed agreement and approval from ICMA.
- Fulfillment of reporting and evaluation requests from ICMA staff and funder by stated deadlines.

# HOW TO APPLY

To apply for the cohort, submit an application via the online form (accessible via icma.org/emo) by the deadline, **11:59 pm ET on March 28, 2025**. Application questions are provided for reference in this document beginning on the following page.

Once an application has been created and submitted, you may continue to update your submission until the application closes at 11:59 pm ET on Friday, March 28, 2025. Instructions on how to access and update your initial submission will be emailed to the primary contact identified in your application.

# SELECTION PROCESS

Applications will be reviewed to create a well-rounded cohort representing geographic, demographic, and economic diversity across the participating local governments. Additional evaluation criteria include:

- Strength of participation team/staff capacity
- Projected impact of participation
- Demonstrated commitment to improving economic mobility and opportunity for their residents

Upon selection, local governments will be required to submit various pre-contractual documents, all of which will be provided by ICMA staff. Funding for the proposed project and travel to in-person cohort meetings will not be disbursed until this paperwork has been received and approved.
