### **LOOKING FORWARD**

The GVSU ICMA Student Chapter is planning to attend the fall convention hosted by the MML in Grand Rapids, make amendments to our Chapter's Constitution regarding clarity of certain voting and election procedures for establishing succession of our Chapter's Executive Board, and resume our partnerships with local nonprofit organizations to continue providing community service in the form of volunteer events.

### **CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS**

1 Coordinated by the GVSU School of Community Leadership and Development in Partnership with Michigan Veteran Homes in Grand Rapids, our ICMA Student Chapter helped recruit volunteers from the Public Administration, Nonprofit Administration, and Health Administration programs and participated in a service day with the Grand Rapids Veteran Home on October 15, 2024. Volunteers toured the facility, met resident veterans, and engaged in acts of service like landscaping, painting, washing grave markers, and decorating for a Halloween event. As future stewards of our communities, we believe that the ideals of volunteerism go hand in hand with community-focused public service. 2 Hosted by GVSU's ICMA Student Chapter, the West Michigan Municipal Executives (WMME) Luncheon, held on January 15, 2025, provided an opportunity for our

members to practice event coordination and networking skills. The WMME is a partner organization of the GVSU ICMA Student Chapter and regularly invites our members to their monthly luncheons and other networking events. Members of the WMME also frequently connect students with internships and other career advancing opportunities, and such events serve as the basis for lasting professional connections.

**3** The GVSU ICMA Student Chapter secured funding from the university's Graduate Student Association to attend the Michigan Municipal League (MML) Capitol Conference, March 18-19, 2025. This event is the largest gathering of municipal leaders in the State of Michigan.

### **LOOKING FORWARD**

During the 2025-2026 academic year, the student chapter will be hosting more events and providing new opportunities for students to engage with local government. The student chapter will continue organizing a student cohort to participate in the ICMA and UCMA conferences, and continue hosting the case competition in the coming year. The incoming president of the student chapter is Jackson Berthold.

### **CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS**

We had a cohort of 10 students attend the ICMA Annual Conference in Pittsburgh. Prior to the conference, we held a preparatory meeting with Wayne Parker, the Romney Institute's City Manager in Residence, who shared how the students can make the most out of the conference to learn and build their networks.

2 The MPA department held a case competition in March 2025 where teams from BYU, University of Utah, and Southern Utah University competed in a local government budget-focused case. The case competition was organized the second time after COVID-19, and this year brought a fifth team with UofU participating as well. The five teams were judged on how well they took into consideration the many different aspects that should have been addressed in the case, as well as the incorporation of the ICMA Code of Ethics.

**3** A group of five students attended the UCMA 2025 Spring Conference in St. George, Utah, April 14-15. The opportunity to meet with the leaders local to Utah was a valuable experience for students, as many are placed in jobs within the state. The interest and participation have grown steadily among students.

### **BUSH SCHOOL OF GOVERNMENT** & PUBLIC SERVICE AT TEXAS A&M

The Bush School ICMA Chapter was founded in 2018, and for the 2024-2025 academic year, the chapter hosted career panels with local government leaders, organized networking events with Bush School alumni, and partnered with the Texas City Management Association (TCMA) to attend the ICMA Annual Conference. ### **CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS**

A group of student members traveled to South Padre, Texas, to attend the TCMA Annual Conference, where they connected with city managers, participated in educational sessions, and competed in the intercollegiate city management competition. This provided invaluable exposure to the field and helped many members secure internships and mentorship connections.

2 Members of the student chapter participated in Public Service Week events, which included a Bush Day of Service volunteer event at the Brazos Valley Food Bank.

**3** The ICMA Student Chapter successfully launched a speed mentoring program pairing MPSA students concentrating in state and local government with alumni and mentors working in local government. This initiative is helping students navigate graduate school, build their professional networks, and prepare for internships and careers in public administration.

## **CREIGHTON UNIVERSITY**

### **SUMMARY**

In our second full year as an ICMA Student Chapter, we held six on-campus events during the fall and spring semesters. In June 2024, we had six students attend the Nebraska City/ County Management Association (NCMA) summer conference in York, Nebraska. In August 2024, our chapter hosted a delegation of city administrators from Norway, in coordination with NCMA and the Nebraska-Norway manager exchange program. Our chapter mentor, an ICMA/NCMA member, met with students to discuss internship opportunities; we had three students work in city administration internships this year in Nebraska communities. registered to attend the NCMA summer conference this year in Wayne, Nebraska. For next academic year, we have several events planned, including a workshop on economic development and an NCMA informational session. We are also working with NCMA to develop an internship program, so more students can gain experience in city administration roles.

### **CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS**

**1** Our chapter hosted a delegation of Norwegian city administrators in coordination with NCMA and the Nebraska-Norway manager exchange program, August 25 – 26, 2024. The delegates visited Creighton University to meet with students and discuss comparative city administration in the United States and Norway. Our chapter hosted a dinner reception with the delegates and NCMA members, attended by over 50 students and faculty. The delegates were also provided a campus tour and attended a Creighton Bluejays soccer match.

2 Creighton University hosted a debate forum for the Omaha, Nebraska, mayoral election on April 29, 2025. Our ICMA Student Chapter was selected to be a community partner of the event, which allowed students to participate in developing

questions to ask the mayoral candidates. The ICMA Chapter was recognized in the promotional materials and at the event. We had 25 students register for the forum. This was an excellent experience for student members to engage with the community and local city government.

**3** Our chapter hosted Omaha by Design, a nonprofit organization that is working with the city of Omaha to develop a new 20-year master plan. The goal of the 'We Make Omaha' campaign is to engage local community organizations and the public to provide input for the plan. A representative from Omaha by Design discussed the campaign, the components of the master plan, and provided opportunities for student input and volunteer roles. The event, held on February 4, 2025, was attended by over 30 students. Participants learned about city government and development, and were able to take an active role in the campaign.

## **GRAND CANYON UNIVERSITY**

Grand Canyon University is located in Phoenix, Arizona, and its ICMA Student Chapter was officially reinstated in October 2024 after being inactive since 2019. The chapter was reestablished through the efforts of student Mireya Ramirez and Professor Evelyn Racette. Since its reinstatement, the chapter has hosted various events, established partnerships with other universities, and received a grant for research on economic mobility in local communities.

### **SUMMARY**

During the 2024-2025 academic year, our chapter has seen exciting new developments, including a significant increase in membership and the appointment of new chapter officials dedicated to expanding our impact on campus and in the community. We've had the opportunity to connect with ICMA members through panels and virtual events, allowing students to engage directly with professionals in local government. Additionally, we've strengthened our collaboration with the Arizona City/County Management Association

One of our most exciting collaborations is with local government officials as part of a funded economic mobility pilot study and community garden project, providing real-world research and engagement opportunities for our members.

### **LOOKING FORWARD**

For the next semester, our chapter is planning a workshop series focused on career development, which will include resume building, mock interviews, and networking opportunities with local government professionals. These events aim to equip our members with the skills needed to transition from college to the workforce and to further deepen connections with professionals in public administration.

Additionally, we are in the early stages of planning a collaboration with local city managers for a "Day in the Life of a City Manager" event, which will give our members a chance to shadow public officials and gain first-hand experience in local governance.

### **CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS**

1 One of the highlights of our chapter this year was hosting the City and County Attorney Panel in February 2025, which brought together attorneys from across the Phoenix metro area to speak about public service law careers and the challenges of working in local government. This event provided students with direct insight into the legal aspects of city and county operations and encouraged meaningful dialogue between professionals and students.

**2** March 2025, we organized a Capitol and Court Tour Day, giving members the opportunity to see Arizona's legislative and judicial processes firsthand while networking with public officials and staff.

**3** At the beginning of 2025, we began our economic mobility pilot study. The project focuses on food deserts in the Maryvale and Alhambra communities, where GCU is located. We partnered with local officials to provide Kroger Boost grocery delivery service to 40–50 families for one year, along with three surveys to evaluate the impact of delivery services on eliminating transportation barriers to food access. Simultaneously, we are planning for a community garden in Maryvale, with the goal of improving long-term access to fresh produce. These initiatives have allowed students to apply research skills directly, network with city professionals, and design real solutions for underserved communities.

## **TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY**

Texas Tech is located in Lubbock, Texas. The ICMA Student Chapter at TTU was established in 2022 by former MPA student Colin Ashby. As the MPA program at TTU is online and inperson, this chapter benefits from operating in a hybrid format.

We were honored to feature two distinguished guest speakers: Danielle Fluck, former fiscal analyst for the Georgia Governor's Office and current budget director for the Georgia Department of Labor, and John Pilgrim, legislative affairs liaison at the Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency. Throughout the hour-long webinar, students engaged in a lively Q&A session, fostering an insightful dialogue with the speakers. Both guest speakers generously offered career advice to students interested in becoming fiscal analysts or financial managers within state or local governments, providing a clearer picture of potential career paths.

**3** On October 24, 2024, our chapter hosted an informative webinar titled "Public Safety & Justice Leadership Careers: Experience & Advice." Recognizing that several students in our MPA program are currently serving in local police departments, county sheriff's offices, corrections offices, and state and federal law enforcement agencies, we organized this event to provide relevant career guidance. We invited two guest speakers: Michael McDowell, deputy U.S. Marshal and former police officer in Carrollton, Georgia, and Carrie Moore, training specialist at the Georgia Department of Corrections.

# **VIRGINIA TECH**

The mission of the Virginia Tech ICMA Student Chapter is to engage members through frequent discussions with leaders in local government throughout the commonwealth and career workshops and networking opportunities via Virginia Local Government Association conferences. Our primary goal in preparing local government leaders of tomorrow is to bridge the gap between local government professionals and students seeking to begin a career in local government.
