Gaming Can Make a Better World

Sunday, October 17, 3-5 p.m.



This year's Opening General Session will feature **Jane McGonigal**, director of Game Research and Development at the Institute for the Future in Palo Alto, California. A leading innovator in game design for future forecasting and problem solving, Jane will discuss how games optimize human ability, harnessing the power of collective intelligence to build communi-

ties and solve real-world problems.

Best known for creating games that integrate everyone's unique qualities into a more powerful and diverse whole, Jane directed the world's first global multiplayer forecasting game, Superstruct, in which more than 7,000 future forecasters from ninety countries came together to tackle such problems as pandemics, disrupted food systems, and climate change. She is currently engaged in a collaborative effort to empower young people all over the world.

In a captivating presentation, Jane will describe how online gamers are coming together to change the way we live and do business in the future.

Diane Swonk, senior managing director and chief economist for Mesirow Financial, was named by the *Wall Street Journal* as one of the top economic forecasters in the United States.

A member of the White House's Council of Economic Advisers and the Congressional Budget Office's Panel of Economic Advisers, Diane also sits on several advi-

sory committees to the Federal Reserve Board and its banks. Quoted widely in the financial press and often consulted by policy makers and business leaders from Washington, D.C., to Tokyo, she appears regularly on national and international television, and her commentaries appear in top financial news publications worldwide. In her book *The Passionate Economist: Finding the Power and Humanity behind the Numbers*, she skillfully reveals how economics is a behavioral science built on the foundation of human activity.

Diane will tap her significant expertise to offer ICMA attendees the latest outlook for the economy, and particularly for local governments.

A View to the Technological Horizon

Tuesday, October 19, 8:30-9:30 a.m.



San José is known as the "Capital of Silicon Valley," a geographic area encompassing much of the southern part of the San Francisco Bay Area that is home to thousands of high-tech companies, including Adobe, Cisco, eBay, Google, Oracle, Sun Microsystems, and Yahoo! A term that originally referred to the region's large number of silicon chip innovators

and manufacturers, "Silicon Valley" is now synonymous with the high-tech sector.

An association representing more than 300 of the valley's most respected companies, the **Silicon Valley Leadership Group** involves corporate leaders in a cooperative effort with local, regional, state, and federal government officials to address major public policy issues. The association's president and CEO, **Carl Guardino**, will lead a panel of Silicon Valley CEOs in a discussion of forthcoming technological innovations that will affect local government management and leadership in coming years.

Change by Design

Wednesday, October 20, 10:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.



This year's Closing General Session will combine ICMA's Celebration of Service to the Profession with a presentation by **Tim Brown**, CEO of IDEO, an innovation and design firm named by *Fast Company* as one of the world's fifty most innovative companies. An industrial designer by training, Tim has earned numerous awards and has exhibited his work in

museums around the world. He takes special interest in the convergence of technology and the arts, and in the use of design to promote the well-being of people in emerging economies.

Tim advises senior executives and boards of Fortune 100 companies, and has led strategic client relationships with such organizations as the Mayo Clinic, Microsoft, PepsiCo, and Procter & Gamble. Drawing on his recent book *Change by Design: How Design Thinking Transforms Organizations and Inspires Innovation*, his presentation will examine the concept of design thinking: the use of design techniques and strategies to match people's needs with what is technically feasible and strategically viable for an organization.

Theme Tracks

Citizen Engagement and Citizen Expectations

Using Technology to Facilitate Citizen Engagement and Community Building

Monday, Oct. 18, 9:45-11 a.m.

What's new in the use of technology to engage citizens? What are other communities doing that you aren't? Are there cost savings to be achieved? This session will explore the use of technology to facilitate citizen engagement.

How to Do Community Building: The Flip Side of Civic Engagement

Monday, Oct. 18, 2:30-3:40 p.m.

This session will use Peter Block's principles (e.g., meeting in small groups, knees no more than nine inches apart) to teach the general topic of citizen engagement, a prerequisite for building community. Other practices in use by jurisdictions (civic collaboratives, citizen education, organizations, etc.) will also be discussed.

Residents Taking Responsibility: Changing Customers into Shareholders

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 3:30-4:40 p.m. During the past decade, local govern-

ment managers were urged to "treat citizens as customers," so residents sometimes have a sense of entitlement, a "you need to do it for me" attitude. By encouraging residents to recognize that they have a stake in their communi-

ties, managers can facilitate community initiatives without taking the lead. This session will feature panelists who have helped their communities turn citizens into shareholders.

Rising above the Economy What's Next for the Economy?

Monday, Oct. 18, 9:45-11 a.m.

Join Monday's keynote speaker, Diane Swonk, for a continuing discussion of the current economic climate and its potential impact on local governments.

Economic Sustainability: Taking the Long View in Uncertain Times

Monday, Oct. 18, 2:30-3:40 p.m.

A changing economy calls for new strategies to achieve economic sustainability. This session will show you how to develop a process for prioritizing new strategies, such as going green. What are the economic development opportunities in going green? What are the economics of a sustainability program? These are just two of the questions that will be addressed.

Jobs: The Heart of Economic Development

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 2-3:10 p.m.

How can local governments spur job creation? Learn from jurisdictions whose economic strategies, such as offering back-to-school training and education for citizens, have created jobs; helped them become more competitive in the workplace; and thus strengthened their economies.

Juggling Act: Finding the Right Combination of Raising New Revenues and Holding Down Costs

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 2-3:10 p.m.

How have local governments coped with decreasing local government revenues? Speakers will show you how to determine the optimum mix of taxes and fees for maintaining services in your community; discuss lessons learned about "selling" new or higher taxes; and describe innovative ways to increase revenues, lower service delivery costs, and make difficult choices regarding permanent cuts in services.

Service Delivery through Creative Partnerships

Leveraging Regional Assets

Monday, Oct. 18, 12:45-2 p.m.

You've heard the saying, "two heads are better than one." Hear from your peers about some real-life examples of regional collaboration for common service delivery needs.

The Human Side of Shared Services

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 2-3:10 p.m.

Collaborating and sharing services with neighboring jurisdictions can sometimes affect citizens and employees in unforeseen ways. How is an environment for success in shared services created? How might it affect individuals personally? How is trust built with partners? In this session, your peers will answer these questions and share their experiences.

Governance Issues Related to Intergovernmental Services

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 3:30-4:40 p.m.

In times of economic difficulty, consolidation and shared services offer economies of scale that can lower costs while maintaining services. But how do you make shared services work? What governance structures have been used? What are their strengths and weaknesses? This session will address creating intergovernmental service agreements that can be effectively managed between and among jurisdictions.

Sustainability: Moving from Theory to Practice

Sustainability 101: Sustainability as a Local Government Strategy

Monday, Oct. 18, 9:45-11 a.m.

Local governments everywhere are working to create more sustainable communities. Panelists will discuss how local governments are using sustainability as a strategic planning and organizing approach for operations, policies, and programs, and are measuring outcomes across a diverse range of indicators and metrics. Building Resilient Communities

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 11 a.m.-12:15 p.m.

Since Hurricane Katrina, the federal government has placed additional emphasis on community resilience. The White House has even created a Directorate on Resiliency. How do you build communities that are able to "bounce back" after a disaster? This session will examine the concept of resilience and its practical implications for emergency management and homeland security at the local level.

Climate Change: What Are the Practical Implications for a Local Government?

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 2-3:10 p.m.

Why should a local government manager be concerned about the effect of greenhouse gases on the planet? After briefly exploring the science behind the effect of these gases on the world's climate, this session will focus on what climate change means for local government managers, how they can analyze their community's carbon footprint, and what they can do to reduce it.

Sustaining Community Infrastructure

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 3:30-4:40 p.m.

Highways and streets, curbs and gutters, water and sewer systems, street and traffic lights, community buildings...you name it: public infrastructure is a major component of the sustainable community equation. Although going green saves money over time, it requires an upfront investment that many local governments don't have. This session will help managers identify the trade-offs in "going green."

The "How to Pay and Save" Solutions for Sustainable Communities

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 3:30-4:40 p.m.

Are you thinking about ways to save money while you improve your buildings, drinking water and wastewater systems, and other infrastructure to maintain compliance with regulations and protect and sustain the environment? Are you delaying improvements because you lack a financing plan or don't know where to start? This session will acquaint you with free tools and helpful resources, including the Financial Dashboard designed by the Environmental Compliance Center at Boise State University.

Technology in Local Government

Leading Practices in Technology for Local Government

Monday, Oct. 18, 9:45-11 a.m.

As your organization becomes more tech savvy, how can you ensure that it implements leading practices in financial and accounting, geographic information, and other systems? This session will show you how to get the most out of technology, understand your IT budget, and create a strategic IT plan. It may also address going virtual, creating disaster recovery plans, and controlling data.

Using Technology to Transform Your IT Roadmap

Monday, October 18, 2:30-3:40 p.m.

Local governments, both big and small, are spending lots of scarce budget dollars managing costly information technology (IT) systems. In this session, representatives from HP will discuss how to free up many of those dollars by using technology to create a converged IT infrastructure. Managers will learn about best practices in using technology for IT transformation and the impact those practices can have on efficiencies and cost effectiveness.

Regionalizing GIS

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 11 a.m.-12:15 p.m.

This session will offer examples of local governments that have worked together to share resources and data to develop a basic geographic information system (GIS) and its different applications. Attendees will learn about the importance and benefits of GIS and about how much information is already available.

Planning for the Next One: Using Technology to Communicate during an Emergency

Tuesday, Oct. 19, 3:30-4:40 p.m.

In today's world, the technology exists to make immediate communication possible. This session will explore innovative ways to disseminate information quickly to staff, residents, and businesses in critical times.

Training and Supporting an Evolving Workforce

Developing Emotional Intelligence in the Workplace

Monday, Oct. 18, 12:45-2 p.m.

Emotional intelligence is defined as "an ability or capacity to perceive, assess, and manage the emotions of one's self, of others, or of groups." What role does it play in the day-to-day reality of local government? Can someone become more emotionally intelligent? And what if you're surrounded by people who aren't? This session will tackle these questions and give attendees a practical approach for developing this important skill in themselves and others.

What Do You Know That I Need to Know?

Our current multigenerational workforce presents challenges: each generation has different expectations, needs, and work philosophies that must be negotiated within organizations and communities. Yet it also presents an incredible opportunity to leverage each generation's knowledge and experience for new and meaningful collaboration. Seasoned managers and young professionals will help articulate what each generation stands to gain from the others and how they can engage successfully with each other.

Balance and Boundaries: Making Time for You and Your Family

How can we effectively set boundaries and manage expectations to allow for both our professional and personal development? Why Is There an Actor at Our Staff Meeting?

You're recognized at the grocery store and suddenly find yourself engaged in a debate with a citizen on a highly charged issue. In this situation, as in many others, it's important to be able to think on your feet. Who does this better than actors trained in improv? Teaching staff to use improv skills in difficult situations is just one way that local government managers can be creative in their approach to staff development. In this session, colleagues will share their experiences integrating inventive strategies to improve their organizations.







Referenda to Change Form of Government: Do They Really Matter?

How does form of government affect the mayor, the governing body, and the top administrator in a community?



Mountain Biking


Sunday, Oct. 17, 9 a.m.-noon

The ride covers about ten to twelve miles. Participants will be guided by local riders on appropriate skill-level trails. Only a few of the finest restaurants may require coat and tie; otherwise, relax and be informal.

Since all but two conference hotels are within walking distance of the McEnery convention center, where most conference sessions and events will take place, and to be environmentally conscious, no shuttle bus service will be provided between conference hotels and the center. Attendees staying at one of the two airport properties can look forward to using the simple and convenient VTA light-rail system to remain connected. In addition, taxis are plentiful, and there is also a free downtown area shuttle (DASH).

Sharing a hotel room at the conference can stretch your dollars and make your travel expenses more affordable.
