City Government

The City of Cartersville has approximately 20,000 residents at this time. Although growth continues as the metro Atlanta area expands north, growth has slowed down due to the current economy. Fewer homes are being built and less people are moving. However, the need for government changes and expansion has not changed. Decisions of the City Council are vital. The Mayor and six Council Members make up the City Council; all of which have a passion for the city of Cartersville. These individuals work together and strive to make the best decisions for the residents and businesses in the city, from policies and procedures to zonings and annexations. Their goal is to make the most responsible use of your tax dollars.

In 2009, the Citizen Survey was conducted in an effort to learn what the City Government is doing right and what areas need improvement. Services were evaluated, such as utilities, parks and recreation, emergency services and customer service. Of the 1,200 surveys mailed, 339 were returned, providing a 31% response rate, which is within the normal response rate range. Of those 339 respondents, 78% believed the services provided by the City of Cartersville were of "good" or "excellent" quality, and 80% felt the same about the quality of life. The Mayor and City Council Members proudly support the people of Cartersville and are always seeking public feedback and involvement. City Council meetings are held the first and third Thursday of each month at 7:00 P.M. in the Council Chamber, which is located on the third floor of City Hall.

City Manager's Office

The current economic situation has made life challenging for everyone. This challenge applies to your City government as well. Always financially conservative, the City has cut its overall budget by 16% in 2010 and has reduced staffing levels to 5% below last year's levels. The City has been forced to trim operating costs, cut a number of capital projects and put other projects on hold indefinitely. At the same time, the City is working aggressively to secure grant funds from the state and federal governments, receiving over \$1.86M in 2009. These funds are being used to bolster public safety, assist homeowners, and improve aging infrastructure while injecting money into the local economy. The City is actively pursuing additional funds for purposes such as energy efficiency, public safety and economic development. Where possible, the City is committed to using local businesses to help build and maintain the limited number of projects that will be underway in 2010.

The City continues to promote transparency and openness. It again sought feedback from the public in the spring of 2009 when it completed its fourth biannual survey of public opinion since 2003. The feedback from this survey serves as the basis for key policy decisions made by the City Council. This is truly "grass roots" governing as it allows Council to base important decisions on resident opinions. Another means by which the City is promoting transparency in government and communicating the value of services furnished by the City to its residents is through the City's performance measurement program. This program enables the City to measure key components of service delivery and to provide that information to its residents through a series of reports and public presentations. This information is also used to show Cartersville residents how their services compare to other communities in metropolitan Atlanta and the nation. In the near future, this information will be integrated into the budgeting process and will be part of the important information considered by the City's management team and key decision makers when setting the annual budget and managing it throughout the year.

The City of Cartersville's citizen survey work and the use of the performance measurement system make Cartersville unique among cities in Northwest Georgia. It is one of a handful of cities that maintain and use these two programs in the state. For its efforts in performance measurement the City of Cartersville was recognized by the International City/County Management Association through receipt of the ICMA Certificate of Distinction for Excellence in Performance Measurement.


As we move into 2010, Cartersville stands ready to meet the current and future challenges regardless of the economic outlook. We continue to use this time of change to re-examine our priorities and to find new, less expensive ways of supplying service to our community, without sacrificing quality of the service delivered. Water Department

Meeting the challenges of today's economic adversities and adapting green technologies.


Over the past year the City of Cartersville Water Department has initiated a number of projects and adopted various operating strategies to meet the challenges of the current economy. These programs have allowed us to reduce operating costs and have helped to comply with "Green" initiatives benefiting the environment. Projects and improvements include:

- Most notable of these projects has been Water Pollution Control Plants implementation of the "CATABOL" Process. Currently the only treatment plant in the country using this patented technology, which has greatly reduced operating costs. Under the new treatment system electrical consumption has been reduced by 52% resulting in annual power cost savings of \$350,000. This process also reduces solids production by 70% which equates to operation cost savings of \$250,000 per year and a reduction in the number of operation personnel.
- Changing operating strategies to reduce peak demands are expected to cut another \$100,000 in annual electrical costs at the Water Pollution Control Plant.
- Fine tuning of chemical feed systems by optimizing chlorine and bisulfite residuals is expected to produce annual savings of \$15,000.
- Shaving of electrical peak demands at the Water Treatment Plant is expected to yield annual savings of \$65,000.
- Process optimizations at the Water Treatment Plant have achieved longer filter runs between backwashing, resulting in an annual savings of \$8,000 and the conservation of thousands of gallons of finished water.
- The Water Treatment Plant switched from liquid to dry Fluoride resulting in \$20,000 annual savings in chemical costs.
- Outdoor lighting fixtures at the Water Treatment Plant have been updated with light sensitive auto cells to conserve electrical power.
- Programmable thermostats were installed at the Administration Office and the Distribution and Collection building to lower heating and air conditioning costs.



City of Cartersville Water Department continues to offer the lowest water and sewer rates around, despite the slight increase earlier this year.

Customer Service Office

The Customer Service Office for the City of Cartersville, which can be found on the first floor of City Hall, is responsible for billing and payment collections for the electric, gas, water, refuse, fiber services and stormwater utilities. This also involves the collection for delinquent accounts and non-sufficient checks. Advancements have been made to the payment process recently, including installation of a check scan system that helps streamline work, online payments, and direct payments from the bank.


In the past year the department has enhanced the security in the customer service lobby area by installing bullet resistant panels, cameras and updating the secure night deposit box. Also, additional security procedures have been implemented to protect utility customer information against identity theft.

With the recent retirement of three employees, the department has been restructured to better serve the citizens of Cartersville. Goals for 2010 include cross-training employees so that everyone can work any position in the department, and reduce wait time for utility customers by giving customer service staff the ability to accept credit card payments.

The Customer Service Office is continually striving to discover new ways to make the utility billing process more efficient and convenient for the customers. Customer Service Survey cards are always available for the public's opinion.

Electric System


The City of Cartersville Electric System has been providing power to residents and businesses since 1904. As a member of MEAG (Municipal Electric Authority of Georgia) and SEPA (SouthEastern Power Administration), the City owns generation capacity from five power plants. The Electric System continually offers their customers some of the lowest electrical rates in the state of Georgia.

However, Cartersville Electric System does far more than just light homes and businesses in Cartersville and Bartow County. For example, they have recently partnered with the Georgia Department of Transportation to upgrade traffic signal equipment in the city that was several generations old, making it more efficient. Cartersville Electric System was also a key element in the downtown Cartersville streetscape project that included the installation of new lamp posts with irrigation lines for the hanging plants.

Energy efficiency has become a very popular topic, as more people in our community are looking for ways to save money and to better become environmentally friendly. To meet that need, Cartersville Electric System has directed a great deal of focus to this area and has trained their employees to be energy auditors. Cartersville Electric Energy Auditors can provide valuable information concerning electricity usage and energy efficiency at a customer's home or business. Also for the energy conscious, "Time of Use" rates will be offered in the near future giving customers direct control over their energy charges based on when they actually use the energy.

- Zoning and Annexation


The Planning and Development Department was proud to receive a \$750,000 grant for housing and \$300,000 through the Community Housing Investment Program (CHIP) during the past year.

Fire Department


Cartersville Fire Department (CFD) has served this community for over a century offering emergency response, community outreach, and public protection. In 2009, the department completed technical training for the Georgia Search and Rescue (GSAR) program. Cartersville Fire is one of the charter members of the Northwest Georgia GSAR Task Force 6. They have maintained a proactive approach at increasing the professionalism of staff through a premier Fire Apparatus Operator Certification, as well as the national Fire Officer Curriculum.

Public Education has remained a cornerstone with Fire and Life Safety Education taught to all age groups from Pre-K through 12th grade. This has been done with various programs to include the portable fire safety house, station tours and alternative teaching methods, such as the Fire Service Clown Brigade. Over 3,000 children and adults received fire and life safety education from the fire department in 2009.

The year 2010 will include the opening of the Cartersville/Bartow Fire Joint Training facility. This \$1.5 million project was funded through the 2003 SPLOST and will enable local firefighters to reach higher education, training, professionalism and service. Our fire department is staffed with fire professionals where the main goal is to provide a safe community and enhance the quality of life for the citizens of Cartersville.



Financial Services

Financial Services' role is to carefully account for the revenue and expenses of public funds, and handle the planning and managing of all of the City's financial functions efficiently and cost effectively. The department provides direct services to the public and internal support services to the City overall. Utility billing, utility connection and meter reading are the direct services provided to the public. The internal support functions include: accounts receivable, accounts payable, managing and investing public funds, debt administration, payroll, grants monitoring, budgeting and preparation of monthly and annual financial reports, as well as overseeing the City's annual external audit.

The 2009-10 budget process was a bit more difficult than past years due to the continued down-turn in the economy. However, a balanced budget was passed with no city tax increase, no cuts in service or personnel, and no use of reserves. To help balance the Water and Sewer Fund and the Gas Fund, small increases were passed onto the water and sewer customers, as well as gas customers, but despite the slight increases, the City of Cartersville rates still remained some of the lowest when compared to other utility providers. These increases in services total 5.3% for residential water and sewer customers and less than 5% for residential gas customers. The Department Heads worked very hard to control expenses, without reducing the services to our citizens. After much hard work, the approved budget for fiscal year 2009-10 (FY 10) was \$142,266,325, a 16.06% decrease from the FY 09 budget. This \$27,222,795 decrease is the largest decrease in many years and is due mostly to the reduction in the cost of commodities that the City will pay. The remaining \$7.7 million reduction is offset by changes in personnel cost, operating cost, capital expense cost, and the Cartersville School System Appropriations.

In fiscal year 2009, there were several hotels and motels that were audited. As a result, a slight increase in the revenue generated from these hotels/motel audits was realized.


Police Department

The City of Cartersville Police Department is continually striving to protect the community, therefore, the department works hard to find new equipment and programs to make their services more efficient. In 2009, the Police Department applied and received several grants to make this possible. Two grants were funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA); one for equipment and the other pays a part of the cost for two School Resource Officers for a year. We also received a \$10,000 grant from the National Narcotic Diversion Investigators Association for equipment.

Currently, the Police Department has 65 employees on board. During 2009 they continued searching for quality employees and improved internal training procedures. Goals for 2010 include:

- Quality Staffing
- Continue Progressive Training
- Acquire GPS tracking for patrol vehicles

The Police Department will also begin conducting a Leadership Academy in 2010 to develop agency leaders for the future. This is part of the progressive training goal. 

Stormwater continues to be an area of focus. Projects for 2009 that are at or nearing completion include the Truck Wash Facility and the Lee Street Culvert Project; some engineering for improvements in the Granger Drive, Terrell Drive, Wansley Drive and Green Ives Lane areas will also be completed by year's end, to be constructed in 2010. The City has just received a \$500,000 grant from Community Development Block Grant to improve the drainage in and along the Wells Street Area. Construction should begin-Spring 2010.

Gas Department

The Gas System, operating with 24 employees, provides gas service to customers in the cities of Cartersville, Kingston, and White in Bartow County, along with a portion of Floyd County. The system maintains over 347 miles of natural gas distribution piping within the service area. During the past fiscal year, more than three billion cubic feet of efficient natural gas was safely delivered to our customers.


With economic conditions improving, the Gas System intends to lay a gas main extension along Busch Boulevard to Cass-White Road/Zion Road. The Gas System is also looking forward to providing the necessary natural gas for the Highland 75 Corporate Park and expanding from the Main Street Shopping Center eastward to Canyon Parkway.
