The Opening General Session will feature a keynote presentation by **Sir Ken Robinson**, an internationally recognized leader in the development of creativity, innovation, and education.

Working with governments, Fortune 500 companies, and cultural organizations across the globe, Robinson pushes leaders to rethink outdated assumptions about intelli-

gence and creativity in order to unleash the real potential of people and organizations. Exposing myths about innovation that hold many organizations back, he identifies the basic practices that drive the most innovative organizations ahead of the pack, a threetier strategy to generate "systemic innovation" across an organization, and the core roles of creative leaders to make this happen.

Immigration Reform: Truths, Myths, and Politics

Edward Schumacher-Matos has had a distinguished career as an academic and a journalist. Respect for his sense of fairness, ethics, and professionalism is such that in 2011, NPR asked him to be its ombudsman. By contract, he has total independence in that role and investigates public and political complaints about standards or bias in any of its coverage.

Schumacher-Matos is a visiting professor at Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism and a member of Harvard University's Center for Population and Development Studies, where he helps direct the center's migration studies program. He was formerly a visiting professor in Latin American Studies at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government, where he also directed the university's Initiative on Immigration and Integration Policy and Studies.

An expert on Latin American affairs, Edward Schumacher-Matos will analyze the difficult choices that America faces as we struggle to define an immigration policy and solve the current immigration crisis.

Great by Choice

Jim Collins's presentation "Good to Great: Not Just for the Private Sector" at ICMA's Annual Conference in San Antonio in 2006 holds the honor of being one of the highest-rated keynote sessions in the conference's history. Six years of research later, Collins has new insights to share in a presentation based on rigorous analysis and infused with engaging stories.

In their new book, *Great by Choice: Uncertainty, Chaos, and Luck—Why Some Thrive Despite Them All,* Collins and coauthor Morten Hansen ask, Why do some organizations thrive in uncertainty, even chaos, and others do not? *Great by Choice* distinguishes itself from Collins's prior work by its focus not just on performance but also on the type of unstable environments that leaders face today.

Welcome Jim Collins back to ICMA as he enumerates—in his trademark contrarian, data-driven, and uplifting style—the principles for building a truly great enterprise in unpredictable, tumultuous, and fast-moving times.

Revitalizing Urban Spaces with Public Art

Wednesday, October 10, 10:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. 💟



This year's Closing General Session will combine ICMA's annual Celebration of Service to the Profession with a presentation by artist **Janet Echelman**, who reshapes urban airspace by creating living, breathing sculpture environments that respond to the forces of nature—wind, water, and light and become inviting focal points for civic life. One of her best known works, "Her

Secret Is Patience," spans two city blocks in downtown Phoenix.

Exploring the potential of unlikely materials, from fishing net to atomized water particles, Echelman combines ancient craft with cutting-edge technology to create art on the scale of buildings. Experiential in nature, the result is sculpture that shifts from being an object you look at to something you can get lost in.

Janet Echelman's conference-closing presentation will focus on the important role that public art can play in revitalizing communities and will offer creative solutions for encouraging public art in a time of declining resources.

Social Ideation: Using the Internet to Gather Citizen Ideas 💟

Social ideation—the process by which citizens can share innovative ideas online—uses the concept of crowd sourcing: the more people who contribute to ideas, the better the ideas will be. On community-created websites, citizens can describe their ideas and other citizens can comment on them, yielding new priorities and ideas. Learn how to benefit from social ideation. *Practice Groups 4, 7, 8*

The Dark Side of Technology and Social Media: Understanding Common Technology Hazards to Protect Your Local Government

Tuesday, Oct. 9, 11 a.m.-12:15 p.m.

This session will highlight a wide range of everyday threats—misinformation, unchallenged allegations, viruses, hacking, theft—associated with running a local government in an e-environment. Panelists will discuss best practices for identifying weaknesses in monitoring and security and for ensuring that social media are used effectively and appropriately. By anticipating a potential lawsuit, your local government can avoid a major unbudgeted technology catastrophe. *Practice Groups 3, 7*

Using Mobile Apps for Citizen Engagement **V**

Now that most people have smart phones or other mobile devices, mobile apps can be an effective way of engaging citizens and encouraging their participation in their communities. Redefining Citizen Services through the Cloud

Survey findings show that the top two barriers to implementing e-government are the lack of financial resources and the lack of technology/Web staff. With the implementation of cloud solutions, however, both obstacles are significantly reduced. In this session, Microsoft and its customers will present three available cloud-based solutions that any government organization can implement rapidly: SpotlightOnSpend, which promotes financial transparency; LiveBallot, which reduces the cost of distributing ballots; and a disaster response portal, which enables communication before, during, and after natural disasters. *Practice* Group 7

Creating a Citizen Engagement Division with Existing Resources



The McDowell Sonoran Preserve Partnership

Desert Botanical Garden



Your visit will take you through manicured trails, the Cactus and Succulent Galleries, the Berlin Agave Yucca Forest, a display of South American cacti, and much more. *Adults, \$49; youth, \$35*

Phoenix Zoo



Attire and Temperature

Phoenix's weather in October is typically beautiful and warm with very low humidity. Average daytime temperatures range in the upper 80s and nighttime temperatures are in the mid-60s. Check the extended forecast before leaving home. Casual attire is the norm for sessions, tours, and ticketed evening events. Only a few of the finest restaurants may require coat and tie; otherwise, relax and be informal.

Location of Conference Events

Located at 100 North Third Street, the Phoenix Convention Center is the primary site for most of the ICMA conference activities. A number of special events and the Monday evening state/alumni/ affiliate receptions will take place at the Sheraton Phoenix Downtown Hotel, which is one block from the convention center. Host Committee guides will be on hand in the convention center and in conference hotels to answer your questions and give advice about not-to-be-missed area attractions.

Getting around in Phoenix

Phoenix is a convenient, clean, safe, and attractive city, and the compact downtown is easy to maneuver. All conference hotels are within walking distance of the Phoenix Convention Center, where most conference sessions and events will take place. In addition, the Valley Metro Light Rail is a low-cost and easy way to access other areas of Phoenix. The light rail runs from central Phoenix through downtown Tempe and right by some of the area's top attractions, such as the Heard Museum, the Phoenix Art Museum, the Arizona Science Center, Chase Field, US Airways Center, and Sun Devil Stadium.

Traveling to Phoenix

Phoenix Sky Harbor, dubbed as America's Friendliest Airport and one of the 10 busiest airports in the nation, is located in the middle of the Phoenix area, less than 10 minutes from downtown. Sky Harbor airport is the only airport in the country with hubs for two major carriers (US Airways and Southwest Airlines). An array of information and services is available upon arrival, including options for making your way downtown. A taxi trip downtown will cost roughly \$16-\$20, tip not included; alternatively, light rail will cost \$1.75.
