RE: OMB Memorandum M-13-11

Dear Controller Werfel:

On behalf of state and local officials nationwide, our organizations are writing to request a meeting with you to discuss important issues surrounding the ongoing implementation of the sequestration order as required under the Balanced Budget Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

As you are aware, our organizations worked closely with your office to implement the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The collaboration that occurred under your direction and leadership in carrying out the requirements of ARRA was commendable and should serve as an example of how federal, state and local governments should be interacting on an ongoing basis.

It is more important now than ever that we work collaboratively to provide needed information and maximize the use of diminishing resources. Many of the difficult issues we face serving the American people require a partnership among all levels of government, and efforts to reduce the federal deficit, including the most recent sequestration order, will require all of us to think bigger and work smarter. In your recent memorandum M-13-11: "Ongoing Implementation of the Joint Committee Sequestration," OMB directs agencies that provide grants or other forms of financial assistance to states, localities or tribal governments to consider ways to help such entities mitigate the effects of funding reductions because of sequestration through reducing administrative burdens or other standard administrative processes. To accomplish this goal, OMB must play a leadership role in providing strong oversight and guidance to agencies. We respectfully suggest that meeting the objectives of the memorandum should be used as an opportunity to achieve red tape reductions, administrative cost efficiencies, and program restructuring while working collaboratively to avoid mixed messaging and uncertainty.

Unfortunately, we already have learned of sequestration issues that surround varying interpretations across the agencies. As you know, conflicting and sometimes confusing communications can cause unnecessary repercussions, as was experienced during ARRA implementation.

We hope to hear from you very soon to set up a date for us to meet; please do let us know if you require assistance in convening the group. We believe that it is important that we work cooperatively and in a dedicated manner to outline a strategy to eliminate confusion and reduce unnecessary administrative burden. We therefore urge a meeting soon and look forward to continuing regular on-going communication and collaboration.
