Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program

- Opportunity to receive funding directly from HUD
- Desire to look at needs of the region in addition to each community
- Consolidate administration
- Achieve expertise of program with shared administration – not possible without consolidation
- Objective project selection process
- Regional governance to work better together and share information



Public Safety Dispatching Services Why collaborate?

- Cost Savings
- State reduction of 911 Centers
- Quality Emergency Communications
- Better regional coordination



Economic Development

- Avoid competing internally
- Join public sector with private sector and education institutional resources
- Pool resources and promotion to extend reach




Regional Property Assessing Services Why collaborate?

- Cost Savings
- Smaller numbers of people entering the profession
- Practice should be similar in each community opportunity without worry for custom approach in each community
- Better regional coordination and information sharing
- Could lead to other services such as regional collection of property taxes



Natural Gas Expansion

- Cumberland, Falmouth and Yarmouth, Maine (wanted service)
- Energy options
- Energy cost
- Economic development



Street Lights

- Desired more local control over street light selection options where street lights are located on utility owned poles
- Desired more choices to save energy through more efficient fixtures and controls
- Municipal ownership options on utility owned poles
- Cost savings from energy reductions and less operating costs associated with modern LED fixtures

Trust – 4 ways!

- Take time to build/maintain relationships with your peers
- 2. Trust professional staff with leadership duties
- If the relationship between you and elected officials
 is one of trust, then encouragement, resources,
 license, and support for regional risk taking can follow
- 4. Citizens need to place trust in you when proposing, setting up, and running regional systems that they will continue to reflect the values, restraint, and accountability of traditional local government
