Basic Assumptions

- Different Terminology: LUCs vs. ICs vs. AUL
- LUCs integrate public health, land use, and economic revitalization
- Variety of sites (BFs, SF, DOE, active & closed military bases, etc.) and laws/regulations.
- Variety of institutional understanding and capacity
- Different LUC models



- LUCs complete the Brownfields Redevelopment Cycle
- LUC complexities demand collaboration among sectors and disciplines
- Effective LUC systems require:
 - Solid state environmental law and program
 - Tracking and information network
 - Implementation plan



- Land Use Control Implementation Plan
 - Non-binding agreement
 - Outlines responsibilities of LUC administration and long-term management
 - Functions similar to MOU
 - Scope: all contaminated sites within a geographic area and/or adapted to a specific site

History of the Project

- Supported by EPA Cooperative Agreement
 - Selected Denver and State of Colorado for the LUCIP pilot
 - Facilitated the negotiation, drafting, testing of the LUCIP
 - Sought input from other local departments and state agencies, community residents, and EPA regional office
 - Final MOU ready for approval

Goals of Denver/CO LUCIP

- Bridges state environmental regulations and local land use processes
- Outlines roles and responsibilities in the long term management of LUCs.
- Protects human health and the environment by minimizing exposure risks and protecting cleanup remedies and engineering controls
- Promotes economic development and community revitalization by ensuring the protectiveness of LUCs

Elements of the LUCIP

- Scope all contaminated sites with LUCs within Denver City/County limits.
- List of participants and their legal authority/obligations.
- Roles and Responsibilities
 - LUC Tracking and Data Management
 - Coordination
 - Information Exchange

Elements of the LUCIP - Cont.

- Roles and Responsibilities Cont.
 - Notification Procedures
 - Monitoring (tiered approach)
 - Enforcement Authority
- Tracking LUCIP Costs
- LUCIP Working Group Procedures
- Appendixes
 - Detailed Triggers & Response Procedures
 - Detailed Notification Procedures



- Make final revisions to LUCIP structure and text
- Sign and implement LUCIP
- Announce Denver/Colorado LUCIP as flagship collaborative effort
- Work with other communities to transfer and adapt the model LUCIP

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
