

**Kalamazoo Public Safety officers target black** drivers in traffic stops, racial profiling study concludes

more than two times as likely to be stopped by police in the city of Kalamazoo than a white person behind

the wheel



A yearlong racial profiling study found that Kalamazoo Public Safety officers target black drivers in traffic stops in the city.

That's according to a yearlong study by Lamberth Consulting, a West Chester, Pa. firm, that concluded that Kalamazoo Public Safety officers racially profile and target black motorists in traffic stops.

KDPS Chief Jeff Hadley released the results of the study -- which are contained in a 47-page report authored by Lamberth – to city commissioners Tuesday evening.





#### Scenario 1B – Traffic Stop Incident

- A Latina member of the public complains that she was stopped by the police department and that she was treated with disrespect.
- She says that officer called her an illegal immigrant and threatened to call ICE to investigate her and her family.
- Her young child was in the car and started crying.
- The woman stopped is a U.S. citizen, an attorney, and connected with the activist community.
- The officer disagrees with her version of the incident, reporting that the woman was speeding, driving erratically, and talking on a cell phone. The officer says that when he made the stop, the woman became verbally abusive.

#### Scenario 1B – Aftermath

- A Latino activist group has formed a coalition with the NAACP and the clerical association to demand change in the police department.
- Key to the demands in that all officers have body cams.
- The police chief says that in addition to the cost of the body cams, he needs to have funds to renovate space for the docking stations and that he needs staff to train officers, overtime for the officers' training, and personnel to manage video. The prosecutor's office says that it will also need personnel to review and manage the video. Finally, your IT department says that it has no capacity to support such an initiative.
- Your mayor and council want you to find a way to deploy body cams; however, you
  have just adopted a flat budget with no pay raises and a targeted freeze on nonessential positions.



  - Open letter to community
  - Supported officer publicly
  - Formal internal investigation

## Scenario 3 - Citizen Broadcast Internationally

- The police in your city shot and killed a man.
- This video is being shown on all news outlets, major and fringe.
- Social media suggests that major demonstrations are being planned.

"He got out his car with his hands up to comply because the police told him to get out of the car. He got out the car and the book fell off his lap, the book he was reading. He got out the car and then he walked around his car to the back of his car. When he walked back there, when his wife was running down saying no, stop, don't do that, by the time she got right here to his car was they had done shot that man four times.

...It was not a black officer that killed him. It was a white officer that killed him. He was bald headed. The black officer came on the scene 15 maybe 17 minutes later. He was the one doing the CPR on him.


I actually saw the shooting. I saw the shooting and I saw that man die..."

#### Scenario 3 -- Citizen Broadcast Aftermath

- The police chief says that the woman in the video is completely wrong. The man shot was armed and presented an imminent threat to the police.
- There is police video of the incident.
- The mayor insists that the video be released.
- The police chief statutorily has exclusive prerogative on releasing video and says that it would be improper and unprofessional to do so before the investigation is complete. People should trust his explanation.

- Formal complaint filed by citizen

#### Scenario 6 - A Plea for Justice

- The police shoot an African-American man.
- Video over the legitimacy of the shooting in ambiguous.
- The police are adamant that the man posed a threat.
- Significant segments of the community and some Council Members are insistent that this is just another example of over reaction to African-American men, who are being killed by police across the country.
- A large number of loud protestors fill the Council chamber at the next meeting with at least as many people unable to get inside.
- The following is one of the speakers.

#### City Council meeting, starts at 50:05, end at 52:2

#### Zianna Oliphant:

"I come here today to talk about how I feel, and I feel like we are treated differently than other people, and I don't like how we are treated. Just because of our color doesn't mean anything to me. I believe we are black people, and we shouldn't have to feel like this; we shouldn't have to protest because you all are treating us wrong. We do this because we need to and have rights. I been born and raised in Charlotte, and I never felt this way until now. It is a shame that our fathers and mothers are killed, and we can't see them anymore. It is a shame that we have to go to their graveyard and bury them, and we have tears, and we shouldn't have tears. We need our fathers and mothers to be by our side."
