- Three Phases of an Event Each is progressively difficult to manage...
- 1. Before

• 2. During

• 3. After

• 1. Before

- Get organized have plans and personnel in place
- Train personnel
- Practice the plans
- Understand your authority & everyone's role especially fire & police.
- Have that "DNR" conversation with mayor and council

During

- Throw out the management book
- Keep ahead of the situation / anticipate
- Pace yourself & staff
- Give authority to act
- Be innovative
- Document everything
- Your biggest challenge will be human especially if people are obliged to leave their homes.
- Don't expect outside help

After

- Impact on everyone: PTSD, \$\$, etc
- Beware of promises made
- Recognize contributions made
- Conduct post mortems on response
- "When CNN leaves town"
- Get ready **now** for the next emergency
