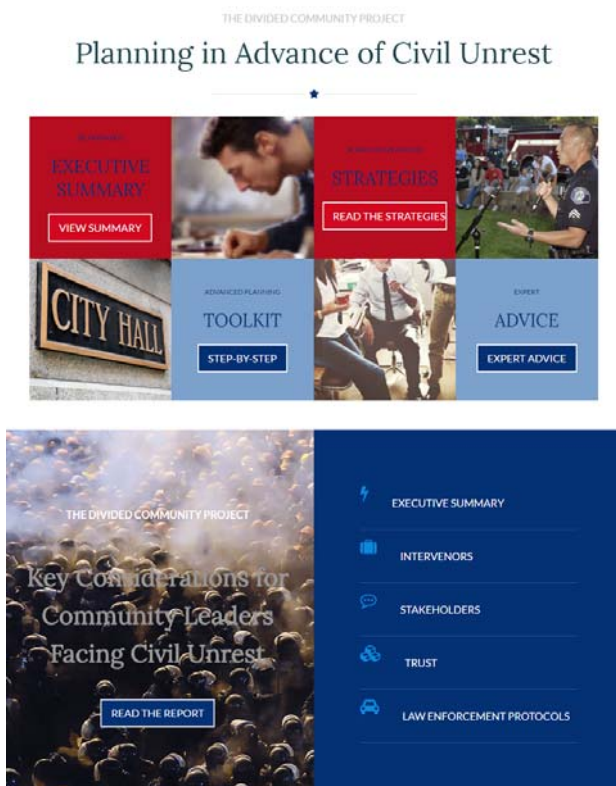

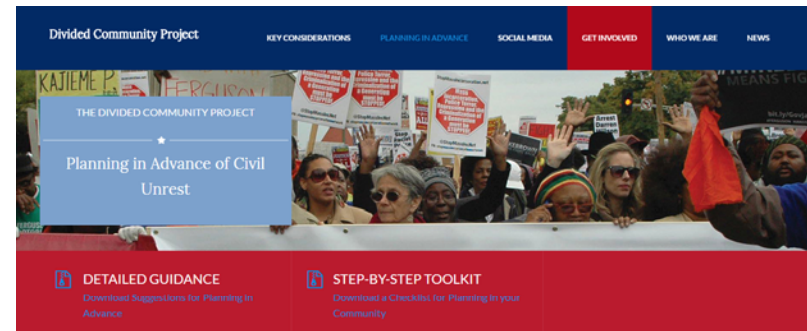
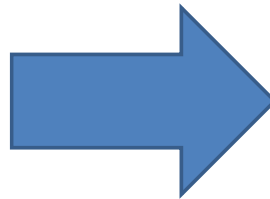

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Broad-Based Community Planning to Address Division


1. **Assess** the level of Division in Your Community
2. Assemble a **Planning Group** which Reflects the **Broader** Community
3. Develop an **early warning system** to identify divisive community issues
4. Develop processes for **residents to raise concerns** with public officials
5. Establish a **pattern of constructive practices**
6. Develop **concrete plans** unrest

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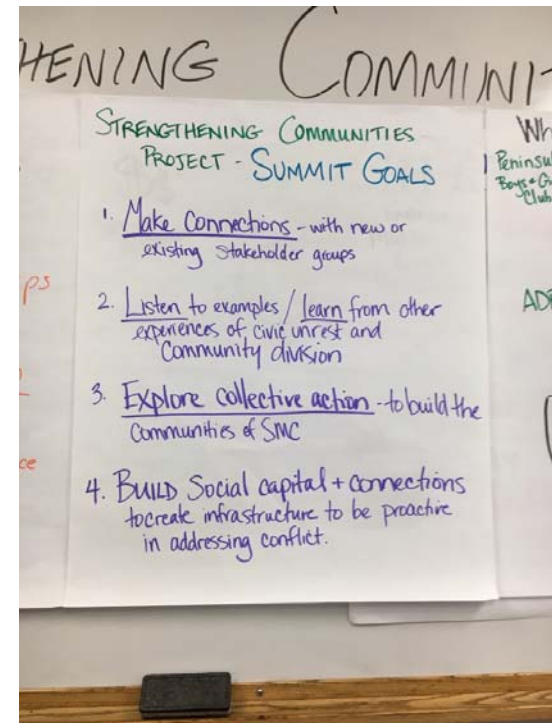
