



#### **Broad-Based Community Planning to Address Division**

- **1. Assess** the level of Division in Your Community
- 2. Assemble a **Planning Group** which Reflects the **Broader** Community
- 3. Develop an **early warning system** to identify divisive community issues
- 4. Develop processes for **residents to raise concerns** with public officials
- 5. Establish a **pattern of constructive practices**
- 6. Develop **concrete plans** unrest


