When the Worst Happens: Employee Care and Support During and After Crisis

Crisis can arise at almost any time and impact our communities in countless ways. As local government leaders, we are not only working to manage the crisis itself, but also to help our employees navigate the stress and emotion of the situation. In this session, we'll talk about the reality of crisis, discuss some common stress reactions, and share tips for how to incorporate employee care into a crisis prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery plan.
