



States and cities often struggle to adapt policies to their context and equitably deliver services.






Strengthening local governments through national policies



In wake of decentralisation in India in 1992, city governments needed strengthening of human resources, systems, policies and tools.


New ideas of municipal bonds for financial automony and sustainability were floated and achieved by a few cities.





The journey of city managers associations in India began in 1997.





All India Best Practice Symposium 2003 held in Delh

The All-India Best Practices Symposium was held it Delhi, Initia, October 16 and 17. 
Use of maps is evolving and local governments are rapidly seeking spatial platforms in India to manage basic services.


Evolving mapping in local governments in India















Slum sanitation and households mapping tool Sanitation map of settlements








How can sanitation mapping benefit ULBs?

Key features


- UMC aims to convert sanitation mapping into a Knowledge Management (KM) Tool.
- The KM tool would bring the sanitation information (spatial and non-spatial) in a handy manner to the field level officers of ULBs for on-thespot decision making and monitoring sanitation status of their jurisdictions.
- We intend to integrate the KM tool as a part of the city's app or with Google for Government/ Google Maps.







- Identification of such areas will help cities to prioritize areas that need immediate attention to prevent slippage in ODF




