

STAR MILESTONES

2007: STAR concept revealed at GREENBUILD-Chicago and supported as a CGI Commitment

2012: Version 1.0 of Rating System released for pilot; STAR Communities organization established

2013: First city certified, Tacoma, WA

2016: 50th community certified; STAR Version 2.0 and Leading Indicators released

2017: 63rd community certified and 1st re-certification; Partnership with USGBC

EVALUATION MEASURE: Community-Level Outcomes

Outcome 1: Community-wide Greenhouse Gas Emissions

Demonstrate incremental progress towards achieving a 28% reduction by 2025 and/or an 80% reduction by 2050 in community-wide GHG emissions (partial credit available)

Baseline Year	Years to 2050	Reduction per Year
2000	50	1.60%
2005	45	2.78%
2010	40	2.00%





Greenhouse Gas Mitigation

Achieve greenhouse gas emissions reductions throughout the community

15 points

EVALUATION MEASURE: Local Actions

- 1. Conduct a communitywide GHG Inventory every 5 years
- 2. Adopt a climate action plan designed to reduce GHG emissions throughout the jurisdiction
- 3. Establish a local GHG emissions target to be used as guidance for local govt. planning processes and decision-making
- 4. Create an education and outreach campaign to engage residents and businesses in GHG reduction efforts
- 5. Establish a climate change advisory group to engage diverse community stakeholders in GHG reduction strategies
- 6. Analyze disproportionate and unintended consequences of mitigation activities and demonstrate activities that engage groups that are most likely to be negatively impacted
- 7. Create incentives to improve opportunities for distributed generation of renewable energy sources
- 8. Implement actions identified in the climate action plan that are intended to transition towards use of alternative modes of transportation and low-emissions vehicles
- 9. Implement specific programs and services or create facility upgrades that reduce waste in the community

INNOVATION & PROCESS

Communities can receive additional credit in STAR by demonstrating sustainability efforts outside of the traditional 7 goal areas. Sections include:
