A presenter on the topic of stress management drew a huge audience, indicative of the current political and managerial environment. She described how a person can manage stress by "changing the narrative" in his/her mind using certain language, thereby adopting a new perspective. Sounds too simple, right? Well, it actually is that easy!

Here's the deal. It's all about the way you think about things, and the story that goes on in your head-over which you have total control. I've been practicing what I learned ever since attending the presentation.

When you get up in the morning, you might normally say to yourself: I have to get up and go to the office. Before a meeting or a trip, you might think: I have to go to a meeting at 10:00am or I have to go to Richmond.

Ok. So, where am I going with this? Well, although for a 12-year-old this is a teachable moment about the benefits of learning to be part of a team and being prepared for when they need you, it reminds me of how critical it is for team members to WANT to play. In our offices lately, we hear so much about the importance of engagement but it's not always easy to recognize who is truly engaged and who is not. My son is engaged in baseball: he practices to improve his skills, he supports his fellow team members, and he plays every chance he gets. Can we say the same about ourselves in our profession? Do we work to improve our skills and support our colleagues? Do we want to play or are we content to sit on the bench? How often is listing a membership or affiliation on a resume the extent of our engagement? Of course, in our daily lives, each of us balances many demands of our time and skills. For me, this often means getting put-in to one game while sitting the bench for another; but for the teams to which I choose to belong, even when I can't, "I wanna' play!"
